Case study

Grime Waltham Forest

Partnership between Beatroots Creative CIC and Vestry House Museum

Award: £37,700 (total project cost £42,700)

- Youth-led research interviews with Grime artists
- Training on film making, oral history interviewing, blogging, photography
- Film screenings, panel discussions and gigs with up-and-coming artists as part of London Borough of Culture
- Lyric writing workshops and events produced by young people
- Depositing material with Vestry House
 Museum to form part of new grime archive



Case Study

Making a Buzz for the Coast

Bee Conservation Trust

Partners: Kent Wildlife Trust, Natural England, Hadlow College

Award: £1,077,900 (total project cost £1,516,957)

- 72 hectares of Bee habitat restored or created around Kent coast
- Working with partners (Councils and Wildlife Trusts) to create 15 bee roads.
- Ran community events and produced new resources.
- Trained 400 community volunteers in recording bee populations
- Landowner engagement



Case Study

LGBTQ History Club

Marlborough Productions

Partners: The Keep archive

Awarded: £9,900 (total project costs £10,200)

- Ran 5 LGBTQ+ History Club talks from local activists and historians
- Archive visits and workshops
- Recruited 10 volunteers
- Exhibition on Section 28 protest in Brighton
- Created a digital archive



Case study

Restoring and Celebrating the Arts and Craftsmanship of St Mary's Beddington

Award: £209,600 (total project cost £252,812)

- Roof and woodwork repairs
- Appointed Heritage Programme Manager and governance training for PCC
- On-site training for 2 apprenticeships
- Hard hat and guided tours, led by trained young people
- Music workshops for young people with Special Educational Needs.
- Arts and crafts activity days, working with museum



We Can Only Fund Projects That:

- Include activities that connect people with heritage in the UK
- Are led by not-for-profit or public organisations or private owners
- Involve a wider range of people
- Consider their environmental benefit
- Have a clear beginning and end point
- Have not already started
- Will evaluate their impact

An outcome is the difference that your project will make. Not the things you will do

We make decisions on which projects to fund, based on how well they address our outcomes.



Our outcomes

Inclusion outcome (mandatory)

A wider range of people will be involved in heritage

Priority outcomes

People will have developed skills

People will have greater wellbeing The funded organisation will be more resilient

The local economy will be boosted

The local area will be a better place to live, work or visit

Other heritage outcomes

Heritage will be in better condition

Heritage will be identified and better explained

People will have learned about heritage, leading to change in ideas and actions



Inclusion Outcome

All projects of all sizes have to meet the outcome "A wider range of people will be involved in heritage"

"A wider range" - means finding groups who you haven't worked with before or who are new to heritage.

"Involved in heritage" – means those new groups will actively take part in heritage activities during the project



In summary – what we look for...

- Clear HERITAGE that you will be focusing on
- Seek PARTNERS if you need them
- CONSULT with the groups you want to work with
- Create activities to ENGAGE a wider range of people with heritage
- Consider ways to benefit the ENVIRONMENT
- Plan to EVALUATE the project

A perfect storm for VCOs

- Soaring inflation
- Soaring energy costs
- Depleted reserves through 2 years' lost income
- Reduced local council support
- Hybrid working leading to IT costs & major decision making
- Council pressures: out-of-date leases and little security of tenure
- Increased compliance & legal requirements e.g., EPCs to let buildings



Key property issues funders should be asked to consider

- 1. Do you ask charities to confirm that they are able to legally occupy their premises for the length of the grant period?
- 2. Is the charity able to provide the grant funded service in a safe, sustainable environment?
- 3. Do grant givers ask charities whether they have carried a property audit on the premises they occupy?
- 4. Are you up to date with EPC ratings?
 - renting a property EPC E or better
 - exiting a property must have an EPC
 - if E or lower you will be unable to let it out to obtain an income
 - prejudices value in the long term

- needs support to exit from their current property which they own and don't occupy &
- support with agreeing a new lease with certain break clauses

Community centre


 owns the land but have discovered they don't own the property on the land due to builder bankruptcy and the property transferred to insolvency practitioner

BME led charity

 bought a building without a building survey in order to run a drop-in community centre only to discover asbestos

Social care charity

 reviewed 3 leases on 3 properties all expired during lockdown giving advice on which leases to renew and on what basis

Who we fund

- Registered charitable industrial and provident societies or charitable Community Benefit Societies (Bencoms)



Who we can't fund

- Party political organisations
- Charities registered outside the UK
- Individuals
- Schools, PTAs, other educational establishments
- Hospitals and primary healthcare providers
- Statutory bodies
- For-profit organisations
- Residential facilities
- Community amateur sports clubs





What we can't fund

- Party political campaigning/lobbying
- Medical or academic research
- Religious activities (e.g. proselytising)
- Work that has already taken place
- Festivals or events that last a few days or less
- Residential activities/overnight stays
- Residential care
- Multiple concurrent grants to one organisation (with some exceptions)
- Organisations within the "fallow period" after a previous grant or application



What you will need to provide with your application

- Your governing document (i.e. your constitution)
- Most recent signed accounts
 (We will likely ask that you provide us with two further sets of financial information after you apply, e.g. draft accounts, management accounts, budget, or forecast)
- Safeguarding policy
- Fully costed budget
- Monitoring framework





How much can you apply for?

- "Full cost recovery" we will contribute to your overheads and core costs
- Up to 5 years' continuous funding
- Up to 50% of your annual income per year
- Minimum of the Real London Living Wage (currently £11.95/hr) for salaries
- Up to 1 FTE post for salary costs
- We can be the sole funder of a project or contribute to larger work
- Average grant size for reopened funding strands available on website





Top tips

- Read the website
- Contact us if you need help understanding our criteria or if you have technical difficulties making an application
- Show us how your work fits the criteria
- You can add a document with additional information if useful (not required)
- Don't worry if your application is a better fit for a different programme than the one you applied under
- We don't need VIP treatment funding is based on your work, eligibility, finances and governance

1. Support for children and young people

We want to fund interventions with children and young people (up to 25) at moments of key transitions, with a focus on:

- Services in support of vulnerable parents and care givers of pre-school children (0-5)
- Children and young people engaged in child criminal exploitation
- Work which addresses the needs of disadvantaged young women and girls

Organisations should display knowledge of the locality or community, and build stronger connections between the range of services available (particularly where this addresses current system shortcomings or failure.



2. Mental health services

We want to support services for people experiences disadvantage and inequality. Funding is available for mental health services and associated running costs, including psychotherapy, counselling, and talking therapies delivered in community settings.

Approaches that understand multiple disadvantages and offer appropriate, specialist responses are encouraged.

We are particularly interested in work that involves and engages people in shaping the services they receive.

Mental health practitioners delivering the services, will have relevant qualifications and accreditations, for example, registration with the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy (BACP), and United Kingdom Council for Psychotherapy (UKCP).



3. Provision of advice and support to disadvantaged individuals

We support work in the following areas:

- Benefits
- Debt (We can only fund debt advice delivered by FCA regulated firms.)
- Money
- Fuel poverty
- Employment problems
- Housing
- Immigration

An advice quality mark (e.g. Advice Quality Standard) is required (or being applied for) for this strand.



4. Food poverty

We want to tackle issues related to hardship and crisis by funding the infrastructure needed to support the distribution of donated food.

We are particularly keen to hear from organisations working to ensure beneficiaries receive culturally appropriate food.

We aren't able to directly fund the purchase of food.



5. Support for refugees, asylum seekers and migrants

We want to support refugees, asylum seekers and migrants to access mainstream services and widen participation in the communities in which they live.

We will fund organisations that tackle the barriers and provide access to resources. This can include but isn't limited to:

- Mental and physical health support
- Provision of legal services
- Assistance with housing and educational needs
- ESOL pre-entry (Level 3)

We particularly welcome applications from orgs led be people with direct experience of the UK immigration




6. Support and services for deaf and disabled people

We particularly welcome applications from Deaf and Disabled People's Organisations (DDPOs).

Organisations working to remove or reduce barriers preventing disabled people from participating in society and living independently

This could include participation in the arts, inclusive or adapted sports activities, health & wellbeing opportunities, support with the transition to adulthood, and evidence-based employment programmes.




7. Support and services for older people

Organisations supporting older people to lead active, independent, and healthy lives that are rich and fulfilling. We will support:

- Work with people aged 70+ that encourages healthy lifestyles and/or reduced isolation through participation in arts, sports, cultural, educational, and/or wellbeing opportunities
- Non-medical services supporting people aged 65+ living with dementia or Alzheimer's to live independently as long as possible
- Support and services for older carers (65)





8. Tackling abuse, exploitation and hatred

Organisations supporting survivors of all types of abuse (including physical, sexual, emotional, economic coercion, or neglect). that prevents abuse, exploitation, hatred, as well as services that assist survivors.

This could include:

- Male violence against women and girls
- LGBTQIA+ community and other communities which face barriers to appropriate provision
- Work with perpetrators of abuse
- Addressing modern slavery and trafficking
- Tackling hate crime





9. Voice and leadership

Specialist organisations who work with underrepresented or marginalised communities, and the organisations that support them, to strengthen voice and leadership.

Currently, we award no more than £100,000 over two years under this programme.





10. Making London a greener city for all

4a. Revenue funding

Local approaches to mitigate and/or adapt to climate change, designed for the specific needs of the area and community.

This could be (but is not limited to) work focused on protecting, managing, expanding, or enriching green spaces, tackling poor air quality, flood/drought mitigation, promoting biodiversity, adapting to climate change, or enabling access to growing spaces.

We welcome applications from environmental organisations, as well as community organisations in collaboration with environmental specialists. Particularly partnership applications that bring different sectors together to find climate crisis solutions.



10. Making London a greener city for all

4b. Eco-audits

One of our approved eco audit consultants can assess your environmental performance.

Applications will only be considered where the lease on the building has at least 2 years to run.

4c. Capital funding for building works identified through an eco-audit

We can also support improvements that reduce the carbon footprint of your building. Funding up to £150,000 towards greening improvements based on a CBT eco-audit.

Applications will only be considered where you either own the building or the lease has at least 10 years in the lease has at least 10 years.





11. Access improvements to community buildings

5a. Access Audits

Up to £5,000 for an independent access audit for buildings, design appraisals, and disability training.


The specialist must be NRAC registered or our partner the Centre for Accessible Environments

Applications will only be considered where you either own the building or the lease has at least 5 years to run.

5b. Capital Access Grants

Up to £150,000 towards access improvements to make your building more accessible and user-friendly for Deaf and disabled people.

Applications will only be considered where you either own the building or the lease has at least 10 years



12. Criminal Justice

We want to build settled lives for those leaving custody or serving community sentences. Services which prepare people for release from the custodial system or who are reaching the end of community sentences.

We are particularly interested in funding work that reduces the risk of further prison or community sentences, such as:

- Work that informs and advises people of the services available to them on release
- Work at specialist premises that support especially marginalised individuals, such as women who have survived domestic abuse
- Safe and secure housing
- Access to employment or self-employment opportunities





13. Small Grants

Up to £10,000 per year for a maximum of 5 year for organisations with an income of less than £100,000:

- greening and growing projects which bring communities together; and
- projects which enable disabled people and/or disadvantaged, older people to actively participate in wellbeing opportunities





14. Infrastructure funding: capacity building and representation

Organisations which provide support to other voluntary, social enterprise and community sector organisations.

We are particularly keen to support organisations working with and/or who are led by groups that have historically faced barriers in terms of receiving an equitable share of funding, resources, and other available support



15. Increasing the quality and scale of giving

Organisations which are uniquely focused on increasing the quality and scale of philanthropy (the giving of time, assets, skills, and/or funding).

2a. Place-based giving schemes

Place-based giving schemes bring people together from different sectors (voluntary, community, public and private) to build stronger communities and leverage community assets.

We expect successful applicants to be part of the London's Giving network and their scheme to reflect the shared principles that underpin London's Giving's approach to place-based giving.

- IF FORMS AND APPLICATIONS ARE AMBIGUOUS OR UNCLEAR OR USE JARGON, SEE IF YOU CAN <u>GET CLARIFICATION</u>
- **READ THE FUNDER'S GUIDELINES**. THEN READ THEM AGAIN. SEE WHAT THEY ACTUALLY SAY, NOT WHAT YOU WANT THEM TO SAY AND FOLLOW THEM!
- CHECK ON THE FUNDER'S WEBSITE OR THEIR ACCOUNTS TO SEE WHAT SORT OF GRANTS THEY USUALLY GIVE AND TO WHO. <u>CAN YOU DETERMINE THE</u> <u>SUCCESS RATE?</u>

- DON'T GO AFTER FUNDING JUST BECAUSE YOU CAN, ESPECIALLY IF IT DOESN'T MATCH WHAT YOU'RE ABOUT. SOMETIMES IT'S BETTER TO WALK AWAY!
- IF THERE'S SOMETHING IN YOUR HISTORY OR CIRCUMSTANCES AS AN ORGANISATION THAT MIGHT BE PROBLEMATIC SEE IF YOU CAN EXPLAIN OR ADDRESS THIS ON THE APPLICATION **DON'T IGNORE IT**
- KEEP YOUR WEBSITE UP TO DATE FUNDERS WILL USUALLY CHECK THIS TO SEE ALL THAT YOU DO, TO VERIFY THINGS AND TO GET A FULLER PICTURE OF YOUR WORK
- KEEP YOUR CONTACT INFORMATION UP TO DATE AND <u>SPEAK TO</u>
 <u>FUNDERS</u> IF YOU NEED TO CHANGE ANYTHING OR REPORT ANYTHING

OUR AIM

The aim of Sutton Soup is:

- To promote the public involvement in community projects that are not run for profit and which aim
 to benefit the people who live and work in the London Borough of Sutton (LBS), to raise funds for
 those projects and to develop a sense of social entrepreneurship within the LBS and to provide
 publicity for initiatives local to LBS that stress low level direct involvement and community self help
 and activism.
- For the purpose of this clause 'social entrepreneurship' means that effort directed at changing the lives of the citizens of LBS for the better either through the relief of disadvantage, illness or through environmental improvement and is irrespective of sex, race, disability, ethnic origin, religion, belief, creed, sexual orientation or gender.
- Sutton Soup will achieve this by staging regular fundraising events at which good causes serving the LBS can present their work and their need for funding.

Do you know a group that needs funding?

Then get them to apply to pitch are Sutton Soup. Your community group can take part if they

- are a community project/charity that are not run for profit
- are seeking money that will benefit the people of the London Borough of Sutton (LBS)
- apply to pitch through the Sutton Soup website
- · provide contact names, numbers and bank details of the project/charity
- undertake to come to the next event(s), should they win, and present how they have used the money

Don't delay - apply to pitch today

Sutton Soup happens four times a year and pitching slots do tend to get booked up in advance. If you apply to pitch now please bear in mind that you are likely to be pitching in 6-9 months' time, although we do sometimes get cancellations and the turnaround can be quicker.

1) Council context for Voluntary and Community Sector funding



Context

- Reduced funding for councils
- Services more expensive to deliver
- Budgets focused on things we <u>must</u> do (statutory services like social care)
- Frustrating as we know community VCS led projects are really beneficial and can achieve good value for money
- Additional funding opportunities often urgent and time limited e.g. Covid-19, Refugee and Migrant support, Cost of Living etc





2) Current Funding Opportunities



Funding to support refugees and migrants

- Funding opportunities for projects or events that benefit recent refugees and migrants
- All voluntary and community sector orgs currently working in Sutton are eligible (providing they have a constitution and bank account)
- Joint bids encouraged
- Send costed proposals to <u>ukraineresponse@sutton.gov.uk</u> (attaching proof of bank account and constitution)





Small grants from local committees

- Grants of up to £1000 available from Sutton's six local area committees
- Grants can be used for events or projects that benefit local community
- Applications open again in <u>September 2023</u>

Funding for improvements to public/community

• **Spaces Neighbourhood Fund** available for larger projects (up to £25K) to address demands of development (e.g. more people in the area)

- Community facility improvements, new play equipment, recycling bins
- Applications close 30 July 2022, more info on council website > Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL)
- Public realm funding available for local projects to improve physical spaces (parks etc)
- Applications open again in <u>Sept 2023</u>, more info on council website > <u>Local Funding</u>





Flats recycling fund

- Offers funding to groups who are committed to helping Sutton to Reduce, Reuse and Recycle waste in flats across the borough
- Applicants must be registered as an organisation and be linked to the flats they are proposing the project for






Uses:

- Covers every London borough, so provides various datasets and can be used to compare the performance across the different boroughs
- A library of analysis reports for different areas such as the labour markets broken down by various indicators such as gender or age
- The blog section of the website is an open discussion where anyone who wants to can write a piece to publish. This could allow for some interesting thoughts to be published which can be incorporated into other pieces of work


- Fingertips provides a rich source of indicators across a range of health and wellbeing themes. The aim is to support decisions to improve health and wellbeing while reducing inequalities
- It is developed by the Office for Health Improvement and Disparities and majority of the data covers every borough in the country
- Various different ways to look at the data such as area profiles, analysis reports or the trends in the data and what they mean

Sutton Strategic Needs Assessment

The population of Sutton was 209,517 in March 2021, an increase of 9.6% since 2011

 Sutton's population has grown at a greater rate than London's and England's

- 7th fastest growing London borough
- In the last decade the percentage of children and young people has increased from 17% to 23%




43% of Sutton residents are from Asian, Black, Mixed/ Multiple and White non-British ethnic groups, up from 29% in 2011

The population has become **more diverse**, **more quickly** than was forecast

The population is more diverse amongst younger age groups:

- Below 50, the population is significantly more likely to be from Asian, Black, Mixed/ Multiple and White non-British ethnic groups
- Above 50, the population is increasingly made up of White British people



Deprivation


Seven neighbourhoods (6%) in Sutton are within the most deprived 20% in the country.

They are situated in the wards of:

- Belmont
- Hackbridge
- South Beddington & Roundshaw
- St Helier East
- St Helier West
- Sutton Central

42 neighbourhoods (35%) are in the 20% least deprived areas in England.

This has increased since 2015 (39 neighbourhoods).



Poverty



18% of residents are estimated to live in poverty (nearly 1 in 5)



10% of households in Sutton experienced fuel poverty (2020)

In some areas of the borough, over 20% of households experienced fuel poverty.

This number is likely to have doubled through 2022.



A higher proportion of children live in poverty than the general population, around 25% (1 in 4)



More than 1 in 5 (21.5%) of excess winter deaths in England and Wales are attributable to the coldest 25% of housing.
